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Subject Cleveland Innerbelt & IR-71: Noise Barrier

Councilmen Cummins, Santiago, and Cimperman and Mr. Garland:

I have researched the answer for the questions from the June 23rd meeting regarding noise barriers held at the Tremont West Development Corporation Office. I am copying everyone that was invited to the meeting by e-mail. There were a few residents that attended that I did not get an e-mail for, so please feel free to forward this information to your constituents.

I will be attending the Lincoln Heights Block Club Meeting on July 9th and the North of Literary Block Club Meeting on July 21st to present noise barrier options.

These meetings will be answering questions regarding the possible installation of noise barriers. ODOT will have the presentation on hand if anyone wants to see examples. For the Innerbelt project, ODOT plans on having one public meeting in late July or early August to determine 1) if noise barriers are wanted by the adjacent residents and 2) if so, what should they look like.

For the IR-71 project, Tom Sorge from our office will be presenting the noise barrier options at the Fulton Branch Library on July 22nd and at the Brooklyn Memorial Church on July 23rd.

I am attaching the figures of the noise barrier locations and the June 23rd attendance sheet. I will send the Noise Barrier Aesthetics Power Point presentation is a separate e-mail.

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Questions

1. Cost of Noise Barriers. I do need to make a correction from my statement of cost. The noise barriers on the west side of the Innerbelt (between Branch Avenue and Fairfield Avenue) are estimated to cost \$800,000 and are scheduled to be built under the first construction project of the new westbound bridge -Construction in 2011-2013. The noise barriers on the east side of the Innerbelt are estimated to cost \$1,200,000 and scheduled to be built under the second construction project, the replacement of the existing bridge - Construction in 2014-2016. The total cost estimate for noise barriers with the Innerbelt projects is \$2,000,000.

The IR-71 noise barriers between Denison Avenue and West 25th Street are estimated to cost \$3,000,000.

2. Landscaping instead of noise barriers. In accordance with ODOT's Standard Procedure for Analysis and Abatement of Highway Traffic Noise Policy, a vegetative screening can be chosen in lieu of a noise barrier. The Policy can be found at:

http://www.dot.state.oh.us/Divisions/TransSysDev/Environment/NEPA_policy_issues/NOISE/Documents/1484_001_Updated%20Version%20of%20the%20Noise%20Standard%20Procedure.pdf.

Page 17 of 35, 2nd paragraph states: "The ODOT meets with the affected residents when noise barriers are offered as noise abatement and provides—the opportunity for them to indicate whether or not they want noise abatement. If noise abatement is desired, the affected residents may choose the aesthetic appearance of the residential side of the noise barrier. A neighborhood may alternatively choose vegetation in lieu of a noise barrier.

Vegetation is not considered noise abatement and is offered as a visual barrier to the roadway. Spending for vegetation in lieu of a noise barrier is—limited to not more than \$125 per lineal foot. This cost is inclusive of all project costs related to installation of vegetation in lieu of a noise barrier. In no—case will ODOT spend more to install vegetation in lieu of a noise barrier than the estimated cost for a noise barrier."

Please be cautioned that landscaping/vegetative screening will be limited to the available space within the right-of-way. The Noise Analysis for the Innerbelt project recommended about 7700 linear feet of noise barrier. The Noise Analysis for IR-71 (Denison to West 25th) recommends about 9407 linear feet of noise barrier.

- 3. Heat created behind noise barriers. ODOT has not received complaints about increased heat behind noise barriers that have been constructed. I was not able to find information on this in other parts of the country, either. Unfortunately, there is no documented or scientific data identifying that noise barriers increase the temperature in adjacent areas. However, noise barriers will effect normal wind patterns and concrete does absorb energy from sunlight.
- 4. Lighting behind noise barriers. ODOT does not place lighting behind noise barriers. When the noise barriers are constructed within 5-feet of the right-of-way line, the limited access fence is removed. The adjacent property owners may incorporate the area up to the noise barrier into their yard. The strip of property behind the noise barrier will still be owned by ODOT and could be used for access to maintain/repair the noise barrier in the future. It is not possible for ODOT to get behind the noise barrier to maintain the property, i.e. mow lawn and trim trees. It would be the responsibility of the adjacent property owners to provide outside lighting of they choose to.
- 5. Maintenance of underpass areas. ODOT District 12 Highway Management department installed gates in the fence at Starkweather Avenue and Kenilworth Avenue. This was done to allow the residents access to maintain the area. In the past, paint was provided at no cost to the Block Club to paint over graffiti. ODOT has discontinued providing paint for the time being.
- 6. Permanent Innerbelt Truck Detour. IR-90 is on the Federal Highway System. All routes on the federal system are designed for interstate commerce and can not be restricted for any vehicle type that meets legal load limits. The Innerbelt Bridge will be repaired to accommodate heavy trucks and the new westbound bridge will be built to accommodate heavy trucks to meet these federal standards.

7. Request for signing - No Engine Brakes. Section 4917 of the United States Code is part of the Noise Control Act of 1972, and sets maximum noise emissions for motor carriers engaged in interstate commerce. According to an opinion issued by the Ohio Office of the Attorney General, local regulations restricting the use of engine brakes to control noise for motor carriers engaged in interstate commerce "may be inconsistent with federal law, and thus preempted and unenforceable." For this reason ODOT will not install NO ENGINE BRAKE signs (R16-H4) on the mainline and ramps of Interstate Routes.

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

By use of the enclosed Noise Abatement Questionnaire, ODOT seeks the opinion of the property owners adjacent to the Innerbelt to answer the following questions:

- Do you want noise abatement in the form of noise barriers or a visual screening to be bult? 1)
- If noise barriers are built, what material type, texture, and color would you prefer them to be?
- If noise barriers are not built, would you prefer a visual screening such as a wooden fence or vegetation?

Noise barriers would provide between a 5 and 10 decibel reduction in noise at the adjacent homes. Noise barriers would be about 14feet tall and located behind the guardrail at the top of the slope. In most areas, the existing chainlink fence would remain. Construction of the Innerbelt and noise barriers would require the removal of about 50% of the existing trees within ODOT right-ofway. Construction without noise barriers would only require removal of about 30% of the existing trees within ODOT rightof-way.

Visual screening will not provide noise reduction for the adjacent homes. Vegetative screening would include the replacement of as many trees as possible that are removed for construction. It is anticipated that about half the trees removed will be able to be replaced after construction is completed. Another visual screening option would be to replace the existing chainlink fence at the property line with a 6-foot high wooden fence. A wooden fence would not provide a noise reduction.

ODOT requests that you return the questionnaire at the August 27th Public Meeting or mail to our office in the addressed envelope provided by September 4, 2009. If a response is not received by September 4th, it will be considered that you have no opinion regarding noise abatement. A low response rate from the adjacent property owners is considered to demonstrate a lack of interest in getting noise abatement and may result in no noise abatement for this area.

The Ohio Department of Transportation has determined that noise barriers are justified for the Tremont area between the IR90/71/490 Interchange and the Cuyahoga River for the subject Cleveland Innerbelt project. The enclosed Noise Abatement Questionnaire will be used to determine the desires of the residents that are impacted by highway noise and would benefit from a noise barrier. The initial request for the residents' preferences had a low response rate. The City asked that ODOT give the residents another opportunity to comment on noise barriers in this area. Dear Mr. Carpenter:

Following the unanimous recommendation of our block club membership in attendance via a resolution passed on July 09, 2009 at our regularly scheduled block club meeting. We are writing the Ohio Department of Transportation to inform you that the Lincoln Heights/Scranton-Starkweather Block Club does not support Noise Barrier Walls as proposed.

Block club members with the assistance of Tremont West Development Corp. hand delivered meeting notices to over 225 residences and business owners in our service territory announcing that ODOT would make a presentation at our July block club meeting. TWDC also flyered the Auburn Block Club and invited them to attend either the LH/SS meeting or a future meeting of the North of Literary Block Club.

Our membership voted not to support Noise Barrier Walls as proposed but did vote to support "Green Alternatives". It is our understanding that significant funding can be used as an alternative instead of walls.

Since there are alternatives available in which up to \$962,000.00 can be spent based on ODOT's own project figures, project computations, and descriptions we would strongly urge the design and implementation of a "Green Alternative" in lieu of the installation of Noise Barrier Walls.

Our membership's vision is for ODOT to devise a long-term plan over a 5-7 year period that would include at first such things as the removal of all dead trees and vegetation, tree trimming, landscaping, litter abatement, and maintenance to drainage systems and catch basins. In the first year of the implementation, a plan for regeneration of trees must be developed in which the significant balance of the funds goes into the planting of new Eco-friendly trees. It is our hope eventually the new trees will grow into a strong noise buffer, but alternatively cut down on the pollution, and dust generated from the interstate. We are requesting that the funding be utilized in a way that no more than 50% will be used in the first year, and the balance of the funds to be divided over the next five years for yearly regeneration and maintenance.

We will continue to advocate for our membership in this matter relating to our position.

Dear Mr. Carpenter:

At the July meeting of North of Literary Block Club, ODOT made a presentation concerning the issue of Noise Barrier Walls. The Block Club decided to wait until the August meeting to vote whereby giving the members a month to do further investigation, discuss the issue with neighbors and be able to give an informed vote.

On August 28, 2009, the Block Club met with the main agenda item being the Noise Barrier Issue. We had an unusually large attendance and a lively discussion ensued about the Noise Barriers. We understand that the people living adjacent to the proposed barriers would be most affected; however, we also strongly believe that all residents of Tremont would be affected to varying degrees and should have a voice on this issue. We also believe that it is unacceptable for anyone traveling this highway, in and out of the city of Cleveland, to be forced to look at the same unattractive walls with each trip. The Block Club is also extremely upset with the fact that beautiful, historical Tremont would disappear behind these walls.

There were three separate votes taken. Therefore, I must inform you that the North of Literary Block Club voted unanimously against any form of cement or solid Noise Barrier. The Block Club voted unanimously for the 'Green Alternative' such as trees and bushes. This would help to make the roadside more attractive and blend with the views of Tremont in the distance. The block Club also voted for the same amount of money to be spent for the 'Green Alternative' as for any other form of Noise Barrier. If the money is available, as it

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seems to be, we would choose to have it spent on something that would improve our environment as well as our view.

In addition, we ask why ODOT is so intent on building something so unattractive on a highway leading to our city, the same city so many people are trying to improve and beautify. We also ask why ODOT is so intent on building something that the majority of residents do not want, the people who live and travel our roads every day. It would be the people who live in and love Tremont who will be left with an eyesore, be responsible for clearing the gathering debris and watching as the walls begin to crumble and crack. We ask why ODOT would want to clear out trees and vegetation that now exist to construct a wall that invites graffiti. Who maintains this structure when ODOT has moved on. Why does ODOT appear to be forcing us to live with an expensive cement wall next to us?
