

Ray Anderson CEO, Interface, Inc.

The story is now legend; the "spear in the chest" epiphany Ray Anderson experienced when he first read Paul Hawken's, "The Ecology of Commerce" seeking inspiration for a speech to an Interface task force on the company's environmental vision. Fifteen years and a sea change later, Interface, Inc., is approximately half way to it's target of "Mission Zero," the journey no one would have imagined for the company, or the petroleum-intensive industry of carpet manufacturing, which has been forever changed by Ray's vision. His Georgia-based company, Interface, Inc., was recently ranked number one in a GlobeScan survey of sustainability experts. The once captain of industry has eschewed his luxury car for a Prius



and built an off-the-grid home, authored a 1998 book chronicling his epiphany, "Mid-Course Correction," and has a new book chronicling his journey, "Confessions of a Radical Industrialist" coming in September 2009. He has become an unlikely screen hero in the 2004 Canadian documentary, "The Corporation." He was named one of TIME International's "Heroes of the Environment" in 2007. He's a sought after speaker and advisor on all issues eco, including a stint as co-chairman of the President's Council on Sustainable Development and as an architect of the Presidential Climate Action Plan, a 100 day action plan on climate that was presented to the Obama Administration.



Peter is the Founding Chair of the Society of Organizational Learning (SoL), a global network of people and institutions working together for systemic change. His work centers on promoting shared understanding of complex issues and shared leadership for creating healthier human systems. Today, this involves major cross-sector collaborative projects focused on global food systems, climate change, circular (zero waste) business models and regenerative economies, and youth leadership and the future of education.

Peter is the author of The Fifth Discipline: The Art and Practice of the Learning Organization (over two million copies sold worldwide), co-author of the three related fieldbooks, Presence: An Exploration of Profound Change in People, Society, and Organizations and most recently, The Necessary Revolution: How Individuals and



Organizations are Working Together to Create a Sustainable World. The Fifth Discipline was recognized by Harvard Business Review as "one of the seminal management books of the last 75 years," and by the Financial Times as one of five "most important" management books. The Journal of Business Strategy named him as one of the 24 people who had the greatest influence on business strategy in the 20th century. Peter has a bachelor's degree from Stanford University (where he received the F.E. Terman senior engineering award) and a Masters and Ph.D. from MIT.

Lynnette Young is the President and CEO of Damespointe, Inc., a management consulting firm assisting in the development and implementation of strategic environmental sustainability programs and the effective governmental relations strategies. In 2007, Damespointe served as the lead consulting firm for the launch of Sustainable Atlanta, which addressed all of city government's operations and internal polices. Since 2008, Damespointe has continued its role with Sustainable Atlanta and has expanded its Corporate Social Responsibility and Sustainability practice to the corporate sector.



Prior to taking on the Sustainable Atlanta initiative in 2007, Ms. Young served as the Chief Operating Officer of the City of Atlanta under Mayor Shirley Franklin for five years. In this role, she had responsibility for the day-to-day operation and management of city government. Mayor Franklin charged Ms. Young with re-energizing and refocusing city staff while establishing best practices throughout city government.

In addition, Ms. Young chaired the Economic Development Sub-Cabinet. Under Ms. Young's leadership the City of Atlanta produced its first ever economic development plan – The New Century Economic Development Plan. Over the five years she served as COO, Ms. Young also played pivotal roles in every major city initiative.

Before moving to Atlanta, Ms. Young was principal and senior consultant with Damespoint Partners, a strategy development-consulting firm. Prior to joining Damespoint Partners, Ms. Young served as Senior Vice President with Carnegie Morgan, a financial and strategic consulting firm. As Senior Vice President, she developed and maintained strong relationships with a broad array of government and business executives for the four divisions of the firm. She also established the firm's corporate identity with new and existing clients and created strategies for clients based on an understanding of their organizational resources, priorities, needs, and policies.
