Bob Paponetti is the Director of Cuyahoga County Department of Workforce Development. Prior to joining the county in December of 2002, Bob spent 15 years working for a private sector training company focusing, specifically, on the design and development of programs that assist employers, as well as job seekers. Under Bob's direction and leadership, Cuyahoga County became the first One-Stop Career System in Ohio to be awarded *Full Certification* by the state. In October, Bob will continue his commitment to foster workforce development as Vice President of the Workforce and Economic Development Division of Cuyahoga Community College. Bob is a member of the State of Ohio Executive Leadership Committee and the United Way Employment Cluster Committee.

Allison Motz is the Director of Workforce Development for the City of Cleveland. Prior to joining the city, she worked for the Cuyahoga County Department of Justice Affairs organizing a variety of crime prevention, safety, and intervention grant programs for youth and seniors. She was also responsible for coordinating the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Crime Coalition, Cuyahoga County TRIAD Initiative and the Cuyahoga County Child Advocacy Center. Allison is actively involved in several community service and charitable activities including the JD Breast Cancer Foundation, United Way Family & Children's Cluster and Learning and Earning Committees, Women's Re-Entry Resource Program, and the Cuyahoga County Youth Council and Prevention Initiatives Committees.

Governor Bob Taft served as secretary of state (1991-1999) as well as Hamilton County Commissioner (1981-1991) and as a member of the Ohio House of Representatives (1976-1981). He has also held the position of Budget Officer and Assistant Director of the Bureau of the Budget for the State of Illinois. He is a graduate of Yale University, holds a master's in government from Princeton University and received his law degree from the University of Cincinnati Lay School. Governor Taft also served in Vietnam with the US State Department and as a Peace Corps teacher in Tanzania, Africa.

Mayor Jane L. Campbell graduated with honors from the University of Michigan. She spearheaded and managed WomenSpace, helped create the first battered women shelter in Ohio, and helped engage women in community decision-making. Additionally, Mayor Campbell worked to pass the Equal Rights Amendment. She began her political career in the Ohio House of Representatives, where she concentrated her efforts on economic development among other issues. Mayor Campbell was the primary sponsor for laws financing Gateway and the Browns Stadium. In 1996, she was elected Cuyahoga County Commissioner. In November 2001, Commissioner Campbell was elected the 55th Mayor of the City of Cleveland.

Commissioner Jimmy Dimora oversees sixteen departments (including Economic and Workforce Development) and a \$1.2 billion budget, and is past Chair of Cuyahoga County's Investment Advisory Committee. He is the former Mayor of the City of Bedford Hts., where he served for four consecutive terms without opposition. A concerned and dedicated public official, Commissioner Dimora is actively involved in many civic and charitable organizations. He served as a past member of the Board of Trustees of the University Hospitals Health System in addition to numerous local political committees. He is well known for his common sense approach to projects and his sound judgment.

Commissioner Tim McCormack's family immigrated to Cleveland in the 1850's. He is a graduate of Miami University and Cleveland Marshall School of Law, Cleveland State University. In addition to Cuyahoga County Commissioner, his elected public service includes Ohio House of Representatives, Ohio State Senator, and Cuyahoga County Auditor. Commissioner McCormack

devotes much of his time to volunteer service including Ohio Legal Rights Commission for the Mentally III and Mentally Retarded (past chair), Ohio and Erie Canal National Heritage Corridor (Board Member), Shoes and Clothes for Kids (Honorary trustee and volunteer), and the Leadership Cleveland Class of 1984.

Commissioner Peter Lawson Jones is the designee to the District One Public Works and Infrastructure Committee, United Way Services Board of Directors and United Way Full Vision Council. A graduate of Harvard Law School, he is a partner with Roetzel & Andress. He was formerly president of the Ohio Works! Company in Cleveland. His abundant civic activities include being Board President of the Metropolitan Strategy Group and Treasurer of Harvard Law School Assn. of Cleveland and the Black Elected Democrats. He is the recipient of numerous awards and honors including *Outstanding Young Men in America*, *Who's Who Among Black Americans* and Ohio School Counselors Association Legislator of the Year Award.

Morning Keynote

Christopher M. Connor is Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of The Sherwin-Williams Company. Sherwin-Williams is a \$5.2 billion global leader in the paint and coatings industry. Mr. Connor was elected Chief Executive Officer by the company's Board of Directors on October 25, 1999 and added the title of Chairman on April 26, 2000.

Mr. Connor, 45, began his employment with The Sherwin-Williams Company in 1983 as Director of Advertising for the Paint Stores Group. He was promoted to Vice President - Merchandising in 1984 and to President and General Manager of the Western Division of the Paint Stores Group in 1985, where he spearheaded store expansion programs and sales and marketing efforts throughout the division. Mr. Connor was promoted to Senior Vice President of Marketing for the Paint Stores Group in 1992, responsible for product development and marketing initiatives. In 1994, he was promoted to President and General Manager of the Diversified Brands Division, the company's integrated manufacturer and marketer of branded and private label aerosol, applicator, caulk and industrial products. Mr. Connor was promoted in 1997 to President of the Paint Stores Group, with annual sales of \$3 billion through 2,400 company-owned stores. In this assignment, he oversaw the company's sales and profit growth in the professional contractor, doit-yourself, industrial and marine coatings and product finishes market segments. Mr. Connor served in that capacity until promoted to Chief Executive Officer.

Mr. Connor serves on the Board of Directors of National City Bank and is a Trustee of Keep America Beautiful, University Hospitals of Cleveland, The Catholic Diocese of Cleveland Foundation, Cleveland Tomorrow, The Greater Cleveland Roundtable, The Cleveland Growth Association, The Musical Arts Association, and Walsh Jesuit High School. He is a 1978 graduate of The Ohio State University. He and his wife, Sara, have three children.

She has been awarded honorary degrees from St. Catherine's College, St. Paul, Minnesota; Youngstown State University, Youngstown, Ohio; and Baldwin-Wallace College, Berea, Ohio. She earned her PhD in Higher Education Leadership/Administration from the University of Texas (Austin).

Mark Schweitzer is an assistant vice president and economist in the Research Department of the Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland. Mark manages the bank's regional economic research activities and his research has recently focused on the interplay between macroeconomic labor market conditions and disaggregated labor market decisions. His research covers a variety of issues, including minimum wages, labor productivity, and wage rigidities. Mr. Schweitzer has been with the Bank since 1992, except for the two years he spent working in London at the Bank of England, the central bank for the United Kingdom. He holds a B.A. in economics from the University of Chicago. He obtained his M.A. and Ph.D. in economics from the University of California at Los Angeles.

Steve Millard is the Executive Director of the Council of Smaller Enterprises (COSE) and COO of the Greater Cleveland Partnership (GCP). Millard was appointed interim COO of the Cleveland Growth Association in September 2003, and was subsequently appointed COO when the GCP was formed. Millard holds a degree in finance and a degree in transportation and distribution management from Syracuse University. He graduated summa cum laude and was named both University Scholar and Class Marshall - one of few graduated in the history of the University that captured both the top academic and top leadership distinctions. Millard serves on the boards of the American Chamber of Commerce Executives, National Association for Membership Development, the National Small Business Association, the Presidents Council Foundation, Community Partnership for Arts and Culture and Cleveland Arts Prize.

Professor Edward W. (Ned) Hill is Professor and Distinguished Scholar of Economic Development at the Maxine Goodman Levin College of Urban Affairs of CSU. He is a Nonresident Senior Fellow of the Metropolitan Policy Program at The Brookings Institution. Ned has edited *Economic Development Quarterly*, a research publication on the American economy. Governor Taft appointed him to the Urban Revitalization Task Force 1999. He is on the board of the Urban Affairs Association, Cleveland Zoological Society, and Westside Industrial Retention Network and an advisor to the Generation and Knight Foundations. Ned was awarded the Robertson Prize from the editors of *Urban Studies* and CSU's Distinguished Faculty Award for Research in 1998. He authored two books, co-edited five books, and wrote over 70 articles, book chapters, and columns. He earned his Ph.D. in both economics and urban and regional planning from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

John Ryan, principal officer of the Cleveland AFL-CIO, has emphasized grass-roots political action and placed a priority on community involvement, including supporting public education. He co-chaired with Congresswoman Stephanie Tubbs Jones and Reverend Caviness the Issue 14 campaign, the \$1.2 billion Cleveland Municipal School rebuilding project. He has also chaired school levies and the TriC ballot issue. He worked with the Cleveland Jobs with Justice to pass living wage legislation in Cleveland, Lakewood and Cuyahoga County. *Crain's Cleveland Business* named Ryan the fourth most influential Clevelander in their 2003 listing. Ryan is a board member of a dozen community organizations including: Cleveland Jobs with Justice, Cleveland Media Development Corporation, Community Shares, Partnership for Arts and Culture, Policy Matters Ohio, and United Way Services.

Recent honors include being recognized as "One to Watch" by *Inside Business* magazine (2003), and selection as an American Marshall Memorial Fellow (2002). He is also a graduate of the 2002-03 Leadership Cleveland class and was recognized in 2001 as a Distinguished Alumnus of CSU.

John D. Carter is President and CEO of Carter Exterminating Co., a premier pest control firm in Ohio where he is responsible for formulating and directing corporate policy and business practices. He rejoined the firm after matriculating from Morehouse College. His career reflects a commitment to small business growth, neighborhood job creation and pest-free business environments.

In 1992, John joined the Private Industry Council, which determined eligibility for the Job Training Partnership Act funds and related training & employment opportunities. In 1999, Carter was elected Chairman of Cuyahoga County's WIB. This appointment was renewed in 2001, the same year he became Vice Chairman of Workforce Issues for COSE and was asked to join the Learning and Earning Task Force. He is on the board of the Greater Cleveland Partnership. In 2002, Carter joined the City of Cleveland's WIB by mayoral appointment and he has been appointed to the National Association of Workforce Boards.

As a consultant to the Sierra club, John has been asked to design and propose "Pesticide Free" treatment protocols for schools. He has developed effective pest-free maintenance programs, contracting with the area's largest private health care provider for this purpose. In 1982, Carter spearheaded the *Pest Arrest Program* with CETA, the YMCA and CMHA that provided training for 20 young adults. Participants became licensed pest control technicians and were employed.
